Spotlight on Activists:

Brad Lomax (1950-1984)

Brad Lomax was a Civil Rights leader and disability rights activist who played a crucial role in uniting the two movements. He was a member of the Black Panther Party and was instrumental in the 1977 504 Sit-In, which led to the implementation of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act.

Fannie Lou Hamer (1917-1977)

Fannie Lou Hamer was a civil rights activist with multiple disabilities. She was a pivotal figure in the fight for Black enfranchisement, women's rights, and civil rights. Her work paved the ...

Johnnie Lacy (1937-2010)

Johnnie Lacy was an advocate for independent living and helped found the Berkeley Center for Independent Living. She also ran Hayward, California's Community Resources for Independent Living (CRIL) for over a decade.

Donald Galloway was a fierce advocate for the rights of people with disabilities and for the inclusion of people of color in the disability rights movement. He held several notable positions, including executive director for the Colorado Governor's Council on Disability.
