June Awareness Spotlight: WILLSTREETWF.com



Happy June. It's time for the keepitpushing.org newsletter. This month I'm featuring a company called [WillstreetTWF.com](https://willstreetwf.com), which was founded 4 years ago during the beginning of the pandemic lockdown, out of the U.K. I sent interview questions to the founder, Will, who as I understand it with some assistance from his father responded; which is what I'm relaying to you now. Will, who has Friedreich Ataxia, a subject I want to come back to and feature an entire newsletter on; has been a wheelchair user for around 15 years. Due to his condition his mobility and coordination is limited, however, he wanted maintain as much freedom and independence as possible. From here he began exploring electric wheelchair attachments and accessories for assisted mobility for his manual wheelchair rather than for use of a mobility scooter. Thus when Will comes across valuable products like the ones he is currently selling, he likes to feature them on his online shop. This comes out of Will's desire to help make mobility more accessible and affordable...

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to people with disabilities. Currently he is featuring an electric attachment that contains two different models, both with a 500w motor 1 with a suspension and 1 without suspension. The attachment works by a simple process of wheeling up to the connecting arm rests, which clamps to the front frame tubes, then pushing the handle bars forward. This lifts the attachment into place and firmly connects it to the wheelchair. Operating the device is also a very simple process. It has a twist grip throttle and left/right brake levers with top speeds reaching 20 miles per hour. [Willstreetwf.com](https://willstreetwf.com) tries to keep their prices as low as possible with a percentage of every sale goes to the Friedreich ataxia charity to help better make independence available for everyone. New models and products will be released in the coming months.
